Job role	SSAPP28 Yarn Technologist
Job role description	Supports knitwear product design and development through specialist knowledge of yarns, fibres and knit structures. The Yarn Technologist evaluates yarn performance, recommends materials for knitwear products and works with designers, knit technicians and product developers to ensure yarn selection meets aesthetic, performance and manufacturing requirements.
Performance expectations	• Evaluate yarns and fibres for knitwear product development • Recommend yarn specifications for garment performance and aesthetics • Collaborate with knitwear designers and knit technicians • Support development of innovative knit structures and fabrics • Assess yarn durability, stretch, comfort and performance • Coordinate yarn sourcing and testing • Document yarn specifications and material data • Support sustainable material selection and fibre innovation
