Job role	SSNST03 Multiskilled Fibre Preparation and Spinning Operator
Job role description	Performs and coordinates multiple operational stages involved in the preparation, processing and spinning of natural and synthetic fibres into yarns within the Textile, Clothing and Footwear (TCF) industry. This role is identified as a core occupation within the Yarn Production function of the Natural and Synthetic Textile Manufacturing Occupational Framework. The Multiskilled Fibre Preparation and Spinning Operator is a highly adaptable technical production worker responsible for operating, monitoring and adjusting machinery and processes across fibre opening, cleaning, blending, carding, combing, drawing, roving and spinning operations. The role supports production of yarns manufactured from both natural fibres such as wool and cotton and synthetic fibres including polyester, nylon, acrylic and blended fibres. Operators work across a range of spinning technologies including ring spinning, rotor spinning, air-jet spinning and specialised yarn production systems. The position is responsible for ensuring fibres are processed efficiently and consistently to achieve required yarn quality, strength, count, twist, uniformity and production performance standards. The role requires detailed understanding of fibre behaviour, spinning mechanics, yarn formation, process optimisation, machine setup, tension control and quality monitoring. The Multiskilled Fibre Preparation and Spinning Operator works closely with production supervisors, textile technologists, maintenance personnel, quality inspectors and process technicians to maintain operational continuity, minimise waste, support machine efficiency and achieve production schedules. The role also contributes to troubleshooting, process adjustments, cleaning, machine maintenance support, sustainability initiatives and continuous improvement activities within textile manufacturing operations.
