Job role	CS50 Maintenance Technician
Job role description	Maintains, repairs and optimises production and processing machinery and equipment across TCF environments to ensure reliable and efficient operation. In the TCF industries—where systems range from garment and footwear production to textile processing and automated laundry plants—the Maintenance Technician supports mechanical, electrical, pneumatic and automated systems, ensuring operational continuity, safety compliance and consistent equipment performance.

Critical work functions	• Rapid and accurate fault diagnosis and repair • Safe isolation and maintenance of equipment • Maintaining equipment reliability and uptime • Adhering to preventative maintenance schedules • Ensuring compliance with WHS and electrical safety standards • Supporting uninterrupted production operations • Escalating complex issues to specialist or engineering support
